Verywell Your child's name matters in more ways than one. Throughout your child's life, people will create the impression of who your child is based on their name. Whenever your child sends a job application, sends an email or makes an introduction, the person at the other end makes an instant impression. Your child's name could predict their personality, influencing how they look and are perceived by others, and even determine their level of success. Studies show that children's names can have a big impact on how see yourself. A child's name can affect everything from popularity to career choices. Here's what the research says about how names affect people throughout their lives. Did you know that test results and admission to college may depend on your child's placement in the alphabet? A study conducted by researchers in the Czech Republic found that students with well-wished names, which are low in the alphabet, tended to get higher test scores. Meanwhile, students whose names were closer to the beginning of the alphabet were more likely to reach competitive colleges. When a name falls near the end of the alphabet, a person is more likely to make impulse purchases. The study found that people with surnames that are near the end of Alphabet are more likely to take advantage of promotional strategies than limited-time offers. Medium initials make the child sound smart. In one study, students were asked to rate authors based on their names. Authors with a median initial got high marks, but the one with the most initials, David F.P.R. Clark, received the best reviews overall. The study authors concluded that people who use middle initials are perceived as smarter and better artists than others. Boys with girl names are more likely to get suspended. For example, a 2007 study found that boys with names that are commonly assigned to girls-like Sue-tend to behave more in high school. Behavioural problems have also been linked to increased peer disciplinary problems and reduced peer test scores, suggesting that their negative behaviour has disrupted the students around them. Research has shown that people tend to pull toward cities that resemble their name. For example, a 2002 study found that people were disproportionately likely to live in places that sounded similar to their first or last name. People named Louis, for example, are more likely to live in St. Louis. The same study that found that people could live in a city that sounds like their name suggested they are also more likely to attract to a career that reminds them of their name. For example, individuals named Dennis and Denise are overrepresented among dentists. However, the subsequent analysis in 2003 did not repeat these findings. A 2007 study found that people unwittingly crave performance results that resemble a name so much that they occasionally undermine their success. For example, baseball players whose name begins with K tend to osseue more than others. K is the letter used to indicate a strike in the book of statistics. Meanwhile, students whose names begin with letters like C and D reached lower grand point averages than students whose names begin with A or B. This result was especially true if students liked their initials. If you grew up in the early 1980s with a name like Jennifer or Michael, you know what it's like to have a few kids in your class of the same name. Or, if you named your child Sophia or A few years ago, you probably know several other children of the same name. While there is nothing wrong with having a common name, some parents want their child to have a special name. After all, individuals like Oprah and Madonna just need to go by their name to know who they are. And many people wonder that they have a unique name that helps them stand out from the crowd? Unique baby names are on the rise. A study published in Social Psychological and Personality Science confirmed that parents have been increasingly giving their children less common names since the 1990s. Jean Twenge, co-author of the study and author of Narcissism Epidemic: A Life in an Age of Entitlement, says parents used to give their children common names so they could fit in and their names would be easy to pronounce and spell. Now they give their child a unique name so that their child will stand out and be a star. While standing out from the crowd may sound good on the surface, Twenge argues that it also can inspire children to think they are extra special to the extent that it becomes harmful. Twenge's co-author, Keith Campbell, says: Unique names can have some advantages, such as creating a more individual identity, but they risk promoting autonomy that is associated with narcissism. There are several other studies that suggest unique names could have potential drawbacks. Here's what research reveals about people with unique names. A 2008 study found that people with unique names were perceived as less sympathetic to their peers. For this reason, some human resources experts now omit names when they are screening applicants. People with unusual names are more likely to have a lower status at work. For example, one study found that individuals with more common names were more likely to have a higher status at work. The study also found that when people's names were difficult to pronounce, they were more likely to be in a lower position. People with unique names are more common among adolescents who get into trouble. For example, a study at Shippensburg University found that children with less common names are more likely to engage in juvenile delinquency. The researchers acknowledge that unusual names are unlikely to cause children to commit crimes, but there may be a correlation with factors that increase the tendency toward juvenile delinquency, such as low socioeconomic status and disadvantaged domestic environments. They also suggest that children with unpopular names can be treated differently by their peers, which may make it harder for them to form relationships.
